# **Predictive Services Discussion:**

A weak upper low will continue to spin over northern Arizona, with continued chances of isolated high-based showers and thunderstorms to the Greater Four Corners region. Stronger southwest flow aloft will continue to spread farther inland over the northwest US ahead of an upper-level trough off the Pacific Northwest Coast, including across the northern Great Basin later in the forecast period, mainly overnight. Showers will spread east across portions of the Inland Northwest into north Idaho and south into northwest California overnight, as well. Southerly flow will increase across portions of the northern and central Plains, which will create areas of locally elevated conditions.

A deep upper-level trough will swing southeast through the eastern US reinforcing a cold front and pushing it south and west through the southern Plains and farther into the Gulf of Mexico. Dry and breezy post-frontal conditions will develop across much of the southern/central Plains into portions of the Southeast, with elevated conditions likely in some areas. North-northeast sustained winds of 12-20 mph gusting 25-35 mph amid minimum relative humidity of 15-30% and temperatures mostly in the 50s and 60s are expected in the post-frontal airmass. Hot, dry, and breezy conditions will occur ahead of the cold front in portions of central and Texas. Isolated to scattered showers remain likely from the Great Lakes into portions of the central Appalachians and Northeast.
