Predictive Services Discussion:

Northeasterly Santa Ana winds will continue across southern California, with peak gusts to 50 mph as relative humidity falls to near 10% and poor overnight recovery. Locally stronger wind gusts to 75 mph are possible in wind prone areas. Lake-effect snow is forecast in the Great Lakes under northwesterly winds today, with locally heavy amounts downwind of the lakes. Dry weather is expected across the rest of the contiguous US, with breezy and cold northwesterly winds affecting much of the East Coast. Strong inversions are likely to develop across the Intermountain West under strong high pressure aloft. Low pressure in the Gulf of Alaska will continue to bring rain to the south coast of Alaska and the panhandle. Amounts will be lighter than previous days, while cooler temperatures are forecast across much of the Interior. Moderate trade winds are forecast across Hawai'i, with a few light showers possible in windward areas.
